Meet our new intern!

Hello, my name is Kaleb Burns and I am a senior at the University of New England studying Environmental Science with minors in both Anthropology and Political Science. I am currently an intern for the Saco Valley Land Trust and am very excited to begin working with them on their various projects!

Through Professor Thomas Klak, I was able to work with the American Chestnut Foundation (ACF). ACF works to find a way to bring the functionally extinct American Chestnut back into its native range. During the early 1900s a fungus referred to as the "chestnut blight" began to spread across North America. This foreign fungus, originating in South Asia, was likely brought in through timber exports. The chestnut was not adapted to its presence and wasn't ready to combat it and was soon wiped from its historic range.

Some like it hot (apparently) BY RICHARD RHAMES, SVLT PRESIDENT

So far, January has produced two record-breaking storms, with the Portland Press Herald headlining "FLOODING AT HISTORIC LEVELS" and lamenting ""a winter onslaught" and "widespread devastation." If the ever-increasing evidence is to be believed, this is perhaps merely a preview of a new climate regime being born. There have been warmer climate systems on Earth before, but there weren't any people around to experience them----much less the human infrastructure built up over centuries, perched precariously close to the ocean and river's edge. Saco and Biddeford were both built to take advantage of such water resources - power generation, transport, and resource harvesting.

But that was in a "Goldilocks" (interglacial) period when the climate was "just right." As NASA scientist James Hansen warned decades ago, "If humanity wishes to preserve a planet similar to that on which civilization developed and to which life on Earth is adapted....(atmospheric) CO2 will need to be reduced... to at most 350ppm."

In May of 2023 NOAA reported a CO2 level of 424 ppm. Sequestering carbon in healthy soil and forests, re-localizing food production, and putting the brakes on car-centric sprawl development may not be the total answer to our climate problem, but it's hard to see a solution without such changes to "business-as-usual."

SVLT's mission is to be part of that solution. Won't you join us?
